Dave Price

Dave Price is the weekday afternoon and early evening weather anchor at WNBC - NBC Universal's flagship television station in New York. He has been anchoring, reporting, and forecasting based out of New York City for fifteen years.

Prior to joining WNBC, he co-anchored Good Day New York at WNYW—FOX5. He steered the morning broadcast through coverage of the Sandy Hook shootings, Empire State Building shootings and Superstorm Sandy.

Before FOX5, Dave spent eight years as the weather anchor for the CBS News broadcast The Early Show and covered major weather events for the CBS Evening News as well.

Dave has had a first-person view of some of the most momentous events of our time. He was in New York City, on-air, as the tragic events of September 11 unfolded. He was one of the few reporters who spent the night enduring Hurricane Katrina inside the Superdome in New Orleans with the people he was covering. He was in Haiti in the early hours of the aftermath of the earthquake, which ravaged that country in 2010, and was dispatched to the oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico as those along the Southeastern shoreline came to grips with the environmental disaster. On more pleasant occasions, Dave has been our eyes and ears at the center of the action during Presidential Inaugurations, Super Bowls, NBA Championships, World Series, Final Fours, U.S. Opens, Olympics, and ticker-tape parades.

He began his TV career in Erie, PA, as the morning weatherman at WSEE-TV. A year later he was named morning weather anchor at WBBM-TV, the CBS station in Chicago. Eventually, Dave joined Fox's Good Day Philadelphia as its co-host until moving to New York to do weather on Good Day New York at FOX Television's flagship station, WNYW-TV. In 2003, he moved to WCBS and CBS News. He has won five Emmy Awards and a Gracie Award for his work.

Dave is a certified scuba diver, licensed pilot and avid photographer. He and his wife Jacqueline live in New York City with their son Eli, daughter Caroline and their golden retriever Wally.

Donna Chapman is a recognized leader in a variety of businesses, and a respected and admired philanthropist of the arts and healthcare.

Mrs. Chapman, née Donna Jo Pearson, is a native of Virginia and a graduate of Sweet Briar College. She also studied at L'Institut de Touraine, L'École Libres des Sciences Politiques, La Sorbonne and L'École du Louvre, and took advanced course work at the University of Dallas and Rice University, Houston, TX.

Mrs. Chapman speaks fluent Spanish and French and is a confirmed Francophile. Mrs. Chapman is President of Josey Oil, a Houston-based oil exploration company founded in 1926 by the family of her late husband, Jack S. Josey. From 1980 through 1992, she was proprietor of Neuhoff Galleries in Dallas, TX. She was well known in the international art and antiques world.

Mrs. Chapman is involved philanthropically with numerous charitable and community organizations, including The Houston Grand Opera, The Houston Symphony (trustee), The Houston Physicians for Peace, Sweet Briar College (trustee), The Bridges of Understanding, The Frick Museum, and the Museum of Fine Arts in Houston. She has served on the Board of Catholic Charities of Dallas, Strake Jesuit College Prep in Houston and St. Stephen's & St. Agnes College Prep in Virginia.

Mrs. Chapman is also involved with Le Musée Marmottan and Le Château de Compiègne. Mrs. Chapman joined the Board of Directors of The American Hospital of Paris Foundation in 1994, and served as the Chairman of the American Hospital of Paris Board of Directors from 2007 to 2012.

A mother of six and a grandmother to eleven, she resides in Houston, Wyoming, and Paris, with her husband, Max Chapman, and youngest daughter, Eloise.

In Memory of



Madame Christiane Guerlain

"A courageous, generous, elegant and unassuming woman, with the keen sense of friendship.(...)
All the important things she has accomplished, or almost, in her life have some connection with
the United States." - **President Giscard d'Estaing**

On any one day over the past 40 years until this fall, you may have seen her in the Hospital's corridors. This woman devoted a large part of her life as a volunteer at the American Hospital of Paris. She was above all committed to providing support and comfort to the patients at the American Hospital of Paris.

Christiane Lesieur Guerlain was the eldest of three children of a leading French entrepreneur. In 1942, at a time when she was struggling with the German occupation of Paris, her father asked her to accompany him to Algeria to watch over the family company's interests.

Christiane, a young French woman from a well-to-do family, spoke fluent English. She very soon found herself in demand and became a liaison agent between the French resistance and American and British diplomats who were preparing the Allied landing in North Africa.

Once the landing had taken place, she decided to stay on in Algeria and enlisted in the army as a volunteer nurse interpreter.

She was intent on providing moral support to the many wounded Allied military evacuated from the combat zones in Libya and Tunisia. "Confronted with these wounded men, I realized that I was in good health, that I had a pleasant life and that I had to do something to help others." She did so for the remainder of her life.

The war finally ended. Back in Paris in civilian life, she married Jean-Pierre Guerlain and helped her husband rebuild the international network of Maison Guerlain that had been disrupted by the war. Together, they made it one of the leading French perfumers. But Christiane needed to do more to help others.

It was when she was visiting a friend hospitalized in the American Hospital of Paris, that the idea came to her: with the experience she had gained with wounded soldiers during the War and what she had seen in the American hospitals, she would create at the AHP a service that was unknown in France at the time, the Women's Auxiliary, a group of volunteer women committed to providing support to patients. She spent around four full days a week alongside patients on an entirely voluntary basis. Today, the AHP Volunteers Association still works with the same purpose in mind, and until her death Christiane remained its Honorary President.

In 1977, Christiane Guerlain was elected to the AHP Board of Governors — whose members are all volunteers — at the suggestion of its Chairman, David T. McGovern. She was the first woman in the history of the AHP to sit on the Board. She became a member of the eminent Development Committee.

She was an Ambassador with an exemplary sense of generosity. Over the years, Christiane Guerlain formed precious ties between the Hospital and the international community in Paris. She organized many events attended by ambassadors, donors, doctors and governors, with her characteristic attention to ensuring everything was perfect: she was always attentive to people, protocol and each little detail that counts.

In 2007 the Board of Governors presented her with the first Extraordinary Dedication Award for her incomparable commitment to the AHP. In 2012, she was awarded the Medal of the AHP Foundation at a reception held in the residence of the United States Ambassador to France.

Christiane Guerlain remained an indefatigable ambassador for the American Hospital and the American Hospital of Paris Foundation until her death on September 18, 2016.

THE AMERICAN HOSPITAL OF PARIS

From the day it opened its doors in 1910, the American Hospital of Paris has brought together the American and international communities in a very special way. In 1913 the American Hospital of Paris received a federal charter granted by a special Act of the United States Congress.

It is America's Hospital in Europe, the meeting ground for European and U.S. medical science, technology and doctors: a place where medical experts and specialists from around the world come to study its management, diagnostic methods and facilities. More than 200,000 patients from over one hundred countries pass through its doors each year.

Shortly after its founding and as Europe prepared for war, the Hospital created the famous American Field Service, which during World War I transported thousands of wounded French soldiers to its ambulatory military hospital in the war zones. During World War II, the Hospital functioned during the occupation, treating more than 100,000 French, American and British soldiers and civilians. In 1940, the French government awarded the Hospital the Ordre de l'Armée and the Croix de Guerre, the highest military honors for service during wartime.







Following World War II, the Hospital continued to expand throughout the 1950s. Housing for interns and doctors was completed to help deal with a housing shortage in Paris, and the East Wing of the Hospital was completely renovated according to the latest in American hospital design. In 1954, an agreement was reached with Blue Cross/Blue Shield which entitled the American Hospital of Paris to file directly with Blue Cross on the patient's behalf, an arrangement which continues today.

By the mid-1960s, the Eisenhower Pavilion was added and the outpatient department was expanded, along with a new x-ray department and an intensive care unit, making the American Hospital of Paris the first private hospital in France to have an ICU.

In the 1970s, The American Hospital of Paris Foundation was formed to raise funds for and represent the Hospital in the United States. A large volunteer team was also organized in France and has been a great asset to the Hospital in terms of manning the patient library, making patient visits, assisting at the front desk, and raising funds.

Within the past thirty-five to forty years, the Hospital has seen extraordinary growth. A new wing was opened, almost doubling the number of patient beds. A new multi-specialty outpatient department was opened, along with a cardiology unit and CCU. A prenatal diagnostic center and a medically assisted procreation center were inaugurated, which today are the second largest in France. CT scanners, MRI and other state-of-the-art equipment, technology and treatments have been installed. The Florence Gould Pavilion, with a 200-seat auditorium and a new medical library, opened. The Check-Up Center, a new molecular biology laboratory and a pediatrics center were opened, and the operating rooms and patient suites renovated. The American Hospital of Paris is the only civilian hospital outside the United States accredited by the Joint Commission based on its stringent U.S. standards.

The Hospital is not subsidized by the French or American governments and relies on patient fees and contributions for its operations.
